

U.S. HISTORY RESEARCH PROJECT

As noted in the syllabus, all students enrolled in this course are required to complete a research project on one specific area of our study of U.S. history. This project will represent approximately fifteen percent of your semester grade.

Students will select a topic from a list distributed during class. Some topics lend themselves to more resources than others, so research carefully before committing.

Your project will culminate in a presentation, by you (and a partner if you choose to work with someone) during class time, lasting approximately ten minutes.

These instructions assume that you will be using PowerPoint for your presentation. If you prefer to do another type of presentation such as a pre-recorded video or dramatic performance, please discuss this with the instructor before starting on your project.

OpenOffice is a free Microsoft Office-compatible suite includes that includes Impress, a PowerPoint-compatible program.
